
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
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
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
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New dynamic duo to direct Africa's biggest design and décor show

As for their event plans, Van Niekerk states: 'We don't want to give away too much too soon, but visitors to both shows can expect all-new African Design pavilions and exhibitions, gathering toptier works from around the world in curated "Best Ofs" that are about creating spaces that foster cross-continental dialogue. We're also looking toward virtual spaces that consider the interiors of the online worlds we occupy, capturing the ever-evolving influence of digital art and design and how they influence our in-real-life experience. New literary, cultural and horticultural programming that emphasises how sustainable design practices are redefining our relationship with nature will also be a highlight of our plans for the new shows.'

In the latter half of 2024, Hayward and Van Niekerk travelled the continent for Capitec handmadeAFRICA, their latest project which has its next pop-up in Johannesburg from 29 to 30 November 2024. They experienced the extraordinary emergence of a new wave of African designers, and their aim is to locate Decorex Africa within this context.

'We were able to engage with designers who are reinvigorating the global design conversation with work that is fresh, fun and fabulous. So for Decorex Africa 2025 we want to bring some of that to local audiences, who are hungry for fresh ideas and perspectives from Africa in how they imagine their spaces and find inspiration,' says Hayward.

'With our work founding multi-brand collective retailer Always Welcome and working closely with so many of South Africa's leading designers over many years, we also want to find ways to reconnect design disciplines at Decorex,

blurring the lines of what design can be. This can recapture the powerful narrative of design as a cultural bridge that explores and elevates African craftsmanship.'

Hayward co-founded Always Welcome with Van Niekerk, and leverages his creative insight and business acumen as Marketing and Programmes Director of the Inside Out Centre for the Arts in Johannesburg and Lead Buyer and Operations Director for Capitec handmadeAFRICA. With a background in economics, politics, and a SAMAnominated music career, he brings a dynamic, multi-faceted approach to Decorex Africa.

Van Niekerk has been named one of GO's 'Creatives to Watch' and described by the Sunday Times as a 'creative force'. He is a retailer, best-selling author and award-winning curator with an extensive background in journalism at publications like Mail & Guardian, City Press, House and Leisure and several others. As Creative Director of Capitec handmadeAFRICA, his efforts have brought the work of hundreds of designers across the continent into the homes of local and global audiences, blending established icons with emerging talents in immersive online spaces, and tactile physical shopping and exhibition experiences.

Van Niekerk and Hayward's expertise across design, art and commerce sets out to celebrate African creativity on an international stage, connecting it with diverse audiences and celebrating its role as a driver of contemporary design innovation. Without a doubt, Decorex Africa 2025 is going to be stellar.



 immersing themselves in the textures, colours, and forms of our rich heritage," says Kim Williams.



When clients walk through the studio doors, they are greeted with a curated space that speaks to the Kim Williams commitment to quality, attention to detail, and passion for storytelling through





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KSA update, November 2024.

t the recent KSA Cape Town industry showcase we had the honour of presenting a collaborative CPD talk between the KSA, IID and SACAP. The talk was in the form of a panel discussion and highlighted the issues of disputes and conflict resolution between the build environment players. The panel was facilitated by Stephanie Forbes, National Manager of the KSA. Speaking on behalf of interior design professionals was Temi Stallings, and on behalf of architectural professionals, Enrica van der Linden.

The premise of the talk was that as industry players in the built environment, the sub-contractor, interior designer and architect have lost the ability to work together with synergy and respect for one another's skillsets and professionalism. The advent of COVID exacerbated this. How do we return to a space of mutual respect and cooperation to ensure the completion of successful projects where all parties get paid.

We started looking at the main frustrations experienced by the subcontractor. We focused specifically on the kitchens and cabinetry sub-contractor. Key to this was the JBCC contract, the pressure it puts on small businesses financially with the requirements for guarantees, the lack of deposits and final retentions. Key also was the amount of administrative micromanaging needed to ensure contractual compliance, and the special terms of contract often imposed by the main contractor that negate any protection the contract gives the sub-contractor.

The second major concern was about materials and how materials are often misspecified to be applied outside their acceptable tolerances. Lack of knowledge about material specifications and industry best practice often leads to misunderstandings and unrealistic expectations on site. The use of terms like 'like or similar' in tenders and contracts was also highlighted as it often ended with inferior materials being used versus what was specified leading to poorer quality goods and finishes.



The final concern raised was unrealistic expectations, and how often to save money a sub-contractor is appointed on price and not ability. When the sub-contractor delivers goods to their capability and in line with the price, and then the main contractor and industry professional is not happy, but in reality, they have received what they paid for and what that company is capable of delivering. The unrealist expectations also apply to installation timelines. When sites are running behind it is often requested that the kitchen be installed when the site is still wet or when there are still many other contractors on site. This inevitably compromises the goods and leads to damage for which the subby is held accountable.

Enrica then highlighted some of the frustrations she experienced that make working as a team difficult. First of these

was the poor sharing of information. Sub-contractors with a special skillset are often reluctant to share their knowledge or techniques, which makes it hard for the architect to learn about their practices and what they need. She then spoke about the lack of client unity and how this can disrupt a site - when the various partners on site are not united and are sending different messages from one party to another. She also addressed our inability to communicate with one another, as each sector has its own on lingua franca and often this use of industry jargon can leave other parties in the dark or frustrated.

The concerns from an interior design perspective were highlighted by Temi. Her first was the fact that interior designers and bespoke item experts like kitchen manufacturers are often brought in too late in the project, and have designs handed to them rather than the parties collaborating to ensure the very best use of materials and space, and implementation of ergonomics is applied. She also expressed frustration that subbies are often resistant to making changes once on site even if these are in the best interest of the client's needs.

We often find that there is an overlapping of skills when these three players work together. Temi felt strongly that instead of this having to lead to a power struggle of who knows best, we need to find a path of mutual respect for one another's expertise and use everyone's input come up with the best solution. Her final concern was the delivery of poor quality. That there is often a lack of attention to fine detail and cleaning when a subby hands over a site which is frustrating, and if time was taken to address these small issues, handover of a site would be a lot easier.

The team then discussed what could be done to address some of these issues to alleviate frustration from all sides and to create a better working environment and result. Pivotal was mutual respect and getting rid of ego. While there may be varying formal qualifications between the parties, this does not necessarily make one more knowledgeable than the other. Experience in the field of expertise must be listened to and collaborative work is key.

Improved communications between all parties will also help – ensuring all on site discussions, phone calls or informal WhatsApps are recorded formally on email, double checking that all instructions are understood in the same way by all parties will also ensure that misunderstandings, not understanding terminologies or lack of listening will not derail the proceedings. Sharing of documentation and being open and honest about contracts and details will also help. It was also suggested that technology like cloud-based document sharing forums should be embraced.

Clearly defining roles and responsibilities from the onset will also ensure that everyone knows where the job starts and ends, and no one will step on one another's toes.

When it comes to contracts it would be helpful if sub-contractors like kitchen companies are appointed as nominated or direct sub-contractors. This will give them the access to the principal agent and / or client which will make communications a lot easier. Professionals were also encouraged to apply the spirit of the contract rather than the letter of the contract. While all contractors must be held to terms it may not be necessary to put them under such strain that they liquidate, and jobs are lost. Humanity and fair understanding should be applied.

When it comes to materials, professionals were encouraged to engage more with material reps and to take up offers on training from experts on materials, their application and tolerances. Better knowledge and understanding on what can and cannot be done with a material will help. They were also asked to use the term 'like or similar' with more clarity ensuring it is clear that this does not mean a material that looks similar but should be a material of comparable quality with similar tolerances and warranties.

It was also agreed that trying to make up timelines by brining on speciality items like kitchens and cabinetry before the site is ready will only lead to more delays and greater repercussions on the good's longevity and a greater chance of damages. Sub-contractors should be empowered to decline to start work on a wet site while too many contractors still at work, risking the goods integrity.

It was also agreed that while saving money on a project is advantageous, appointing a company that is not skilled or experienced enough to complete the work then complaining they have under delivered is not constructive. Research should be done on the company's capabilities, particularly when working with high end materials to ensure their design, manufacturing and installation skills can deliver to expectations.

It was agreed that if professionals understood that on site design changes will lead to an extension of up to two weeks per change, then these can be accepted. This is because remanufacturing of items and adapting for onsite changes goes to the back of the subby's production line (they are often doing five to ten other kitchens at



the same time). Changes should be well documented and communicated, and timeline extensions communicated to all parties including the client.

Good quality control can be better ensured with regular site meetings and hands on site supervision. Appointing the right company for the job with experience and a track record will also help.

Quick and effective handing over and snagging can be achieved if the ongoing quality control is done, and if the client and professional take the time to do one comprehensive snag list instead of an ongoing line of small snags - ongoing snagging leads to more site errors. The subby must also ensure that snags get priority. The sooner the snag is corrected the sooner the job can be signed off. In doing snagging, it is vital all parties realise that kitchens and cabinetry are bespoke or special-order items in the eyes of the Consumer Protection Act, and are not covered in the same way as over the counter goods. It is also important that the client and professional know what the industry acceptable tolerances are and compare the workmanship to that of the subby's showroom, should they have

In summing up, the panel were in agreement that in overview the most important thing we can do to improve things between the various on-site parties is to bring back objectivity, realism, humanity and fairness. All these with good communication and an outlook of collaboration without ego will go a long way to better how we all work together and help ensure a space of equals not combatants.



El Departamento designs 'Nude Library',

Nude Project's new permanent Store at La Roca Village

a Roca Village welcomes the first permanent store of streetwear brand Nude Project, designed by architecture and interior design studio El Departamento. This new 100-square-metre space breathes both the brand's essence and the atmosphere of its privileged setting, creating an environment that explores the intersections between design, art, and community.





A space inspired by La Roca Village's spirit

Drawing inspiration from La Roca Village's distinctive character, which evokes a late 19th and early 20th-century Catalan village, El Departamento has envisioned a space that integrates seamlessly into this vibrant environment, with its streets, main square, theatre, and commercial promenade. To complete this narrative, studio co-founders Alberto Eltini and Marina Martín have materialised what was missing: a bookstore as a new cultural landmark.

This is how 'Nude Library' was born, a space where the DJ booth reflects the brand's connection with art and music, while an imposing six-metre-high wooden bookshelf symbolises the creative and cultural inspiration that defines its identity. This central axis combines visual and material references that link architecture with culture and the creative community, reinforcing Nude Project's philosophy: "By Artists, For Artists."

Brand community at the heart of design

El Departamento has leveraged the space's six-metre ceiling height to erect an imposing wooden bookshelf that spans the main wall and integrates a DJ booth at its centre, organically uniting the architectural structure with the brand's

artistic essence. This vertical element not only organises the space but also creates a visual impact that invites exploration and delivers an immersive experience.

To optimise the 100 square metres available, the studio has structured the space across two levels. At the rear, they designed a mezzanine for storage, creating an engaging interplay of heights that adds dynamism to the customer journey. This architectural detail, addressing both functionality and aesthetics, intensifies the store's verticality and establishes the bookshelf as the protagonist element.

Contrasting with the bookshelf's sobriety, the fitting room area features Nude Project's signature baby blue, with rounded forms and soft textures that generate a welcoming and balanced atmosphere.

'Nude Library' marks El Departamento's eighth retail project for Nude Project, joining existing spaces in Madrid, Barcelona, Lisbon, Valencia, Ibiza, Bilbao, and Milan. The creative collaboration between the studio and the brand will continue with an upcoming opening in Amsterdam, further consolidating the brand's European expansion and reaffirming a shared vision where retail and culture converge in each new space.






Honouring Architectural Lineage: Conner + Perry Architects Usher in a New Phase for an LA Landmark

Los Angeles, United States

os Angeles-based Conner + Perry Architects, the current architects of record for the Sheats-Goldstein Residence and Estate, unveil the property's newly completed annex, Club James. Originally envisioned by renowned mid-century architect John Lautner and estate owner James Goldstein, the development and completion of the accessory entertainment facility above a fully collaborative effort between Goldstein and three design teams that spans nearly fifty years.

As one of Los Angeles's most famous mid-century homes, the Sheats-Goldstein Residence is nearly as iconic as the Hollywood sign itself, having been featured countless times in film, television, fashion, and music videos, and widely revered in architecture and design circles. With a long and complex construction history that initially began in 1962 between John Lautner and the Sheats family, and later with Lautner and current owner James Goldstein, the famed Beverly Hills enclave has been expanded upon and enhanced



numerous times throughout the last seven decades in collaboration with three different architectural teams. Kristopher Conner and James Perry, of Conner + Perry Architects, have collaborated with Goldstein on the design and have overseen subsequent additions since 2015. Prior to that, the duo worked as Project Architects with Duncan Nicholson, Lautner's apprentice and associate, who continued work at the property following Lautner's death in 1994.

The newest work on the property, Club James, is located adjacent to the original residence. It was determined, due to the intensive nature of construction required for the planned hillside tennis court, that the office and a new entertainment space should be located beneath the new structure.

While Lautner's original master plan can still be seen in the wood and cardboard model hanging in the house today, the current design for Club James was initially a collaboration between Goldstein and Nicholson, and later Conner + Perry Architects. Construction first started in the early 2000s and, as the project continued, the programme expanded and evolved to include an entertainment space, VIP room and library, offices for Goldstein and his assistants, a movie screening room, an outdoor terrace with dining and kitchen facilities, and a pool and spa. The current team's latest design for the outdoor terrace, which includes the main stair, restroom, kitchen and BBQ zones, dining tables, locker room, and pool, was completed in 2023.

"The most rewarding aspect of this project is working with a client and patron like Jim who enjoys the process as much as the outcome and has the perseverance to pursue an architecture that will stand the test of time," notes James Perry.

"It was a huge responsibility and an honour to take over the reins of this project and to be included in the lineage of amazing designers involved in the development and expansion of the property over the decades." adds Kristopher Conner. "It is a delicate balance to preserve and respect the genius of the original residence while developing designs that are in dialogue with it. We look at our work as an evolution of the visual language established by Lautner. The DNA of the house is there, but the expression is adapted to the environment and functions of the new spaces."

WINDOW TREATMENTS

Beyond cultivating these new and ever-changing designs, Conner + Perry Architects also oversee maintenance and restoration work on the original Sheats-Goldstein Residence, as well as repairs and upgrades to the James Turrell Skyspace installation "Above Horizon." Just like Nicholson before them, Conner and Perry's designs aim to honour Lautner and Goldstein's architectural legacy by keeping with the tenets of the philosophy of organic architecture, adapting core ideas to meet new functions, inventing new details and forms, and creating spaces that celebrate freedom in the human spirit.

"The thing that differentiates this property from many other significant mid-century homes in LA is that it is not a static museum frozen in time or a private retreat," says Perry. "It is full of life, with tours, and shoots, and events, all of which expose the public to this unique work of progressing and improving, with a lineage of three generations of architects and a team of consultants and trades people who make it all possible."

In fact, in a remarkable act of philanthropy, Goldstein has bequeathed the entire property, as well as his extensive fashion and art collections, to the Los Angeles County Museum of Art (LACMA), ensuring that this architectural treasure and cultural mainstay will be preserved, shared with the public, and serve to inspire future generations of designers.


"John Lautner's work is a radical

advancement in his teacher Frank Lloyd Wright's search for a uniquely American architectural language; it is somehow both of its time and timeless, an expression of boundless optimism and freedom, an attempt to reconnect us to nature through an embrace of technological advancement with a deep appreciation of human craft," concludes Conner. The Vision

Inspiration from Marrakech

This blend of artistry and functionality influenced the Coulisse campus design, resulting in a space that epitomises sophistication and creativity.

Phases of Development

The campus development is planned in three phases. Phase One, now complete, includes a new logistics centre with offices for the warehouse and customer service teams. Phase Two will expand the logistics centre with a fully automated warehouse, childcare facilities, and sports amenities for employees. Phase Three will relocate the remaining company departments, including management, IT, finance, marketing, engineering, and sales teams, as well as the smart experience centre, to the new campus.

Architectural Collaboration

The architectural design of the Coulisse Campus is the result of a unique collaboration between the renowned Italian firm Piuarch and Erwin Kleinsman Architects. Christiaan shares the serendipitous story of how the partnership with Piuarch began: "I had a chance

encounter with Francesco Fresa, Piuarch's partner and co-founder, at an open house during the Milan design furniture fair in 2018. We ended up talking for hours, forming an instant connection."

Erwin Kleinsman Architects, Coulisse's trusted partners since 2000, brought their deep understanding of the company's style to the project. The collaborative process explored various options for materials and building shapes, ultimately settling on brick as the main material to reflect the history of the 19th-century textile industry while creating a unique blend of traditional and modern design elements.

Official Opening and Future Plans

On September 14, 2024, Coulisse celebrated the official opening of its new logistics centre, marking the completion of Phase One. The event honoured the company's journey and the legacy of the Roetgering family, particularly Truus Roetgering, whose vision and values have deeply influenced the business.

Looking ahead, Phases Two and Three will further transform the campus. Phase Two will introduce a cutting-edge, fully automated warehouse with RFID technology, capable of storing up to 120,000 rolls of fabric. Phase Three, planned for completion over the next decade, will bring all Coulisse departments together on the campus.

Christiaan reflects on the future with excitement: "The completion of Phase One is just the beginning. Our goal is to create a campus that reflects our values—timeless, functional, and beautiful. Phases Two and Three will not only transform our operations but further solidify Coulisse as a leader in the window covering industry. We're just getting started on this incredible journey."


















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Reimagining an innercity office campus

Cape Town, South Africa

dhk Interior Design has successfully completed the refurbishment of a new campus for Good Hope Studies, an internationally accredited English language school located in the Cape Town city centre. The project exemplifies how workspaces in an existing, bustling inner-city older building can be reimagined to

















The brief was to create a school campus that embodied the spirit of Cape Town. Good Hope Studies focuses on providing a relaxed fun learning environment for foreign students. The goal was to create a contemporary educational space that also showcased Cape Town's unique character and that would be instantly recognisable to international students.

dhki Director Lisa Bridgeford explains: "We've been deliberate in selecting materials, colours, and graphics to reflect the vibrancy and diversity of Cape Town's CBD. Our design incorporates elements that refer to the cityscapes of Cape Town, the harbour and the fauna and lora of Table Mountain. These elements are translated into the forms, shapes and colours you see in the final design."


Good Hope Studies was established in 1995, with its first branch opening in Newlands, Cape Town. Soon after, a second branch followed in the Cape Town City Centre at St Georges Mall. After years of growth and success, the founders acquired new premises at 2 Long Street to relocate the city centre branch.

dhki was appointed to the project after successful response to a request for proposal (RFP). Alexander Kratochwil, Director for Good Hope Studies, noted: "We wanted a designer who could make our students feel at home in their learning environment while far from their own homes. dhki's design proposals reflected our full vision for the project, and their implementation on time and on budget has been a real asset to our expansion."

Four Houses Pinares

Valle de Bravo, Mexico

n a completely wooded and descending topography, Grupo Arquitectura carried out a project of four independent two-level houses with their common amenities. When the architects went to visit the site and saw huge trees, they decided not to touch them. Instead, they planted the houses in an almost surgical way, adapting to the unevenness and natural conditions of the land. The final result is houses that appear to have been built for years, as well as vegetation that was planted at the same time as the construction.

The structure of the houses is metallic, with the floors, beams and wooden panels that were left apparent. The walls of the houses are made of Silver Travertine and wooden panels. The retaining walls and general fences of the complex are made of regional stone, placed without a joint. The interior floors and terraces are made of a grey stone from India called Caledonia.

The design of the houses is staggered, with the living areas having descending views, leaving the circulation and services around the rear façade to achieve privacy. All installation systems were thoughtfully conceived, respecting the environment. Wastewater is recycled and treated, while lighting is automated for greater efficiency. Additionally, the windows feature state-of-the-art glass designed to conserve temperature and isolate noise.



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TAIL OF THE DOG

ne of South Korea's highest earning exports are Korean TV Series. Awareness of this style of TV drama created the 1990's Korean Wave, and Netflix helped to create a tsunami of interest by streaming and supporting TV dramas from 2010. This was further pushed into our TV watching consciousness in 2021 by Squid Game, a series that had 111 million viewers by the first three weeks.

There is almost a template for each series - rich spoilt, entitled boy/ girl meets honest, hardworking, outspoken boy/girl, hearts start to beat, a secret romance blossoms in the workplace, hometown, schoolroom. The sets are gorgeous with glamorous high-rise penthouse apartments and offices, or homely small living spaces with scruffy rooftop gardens. The clothes are glamorous, with finely tailored suits and coats, or homespun with oversized handknitted jerseys. There is a lot related to food, served from street stalls, or in fine dining restaurants.

The Luck of the Irish

There is usually a scene where a lot of drinking takes place with soju (similar to vodka but slightly less alcoholic) served neat in shot glasses either sipped or knocked back.

Product endorsement is very visible – cars, phones, watches, clothes, shoes, handbags (lots of these) and cordless Dyson hand-held vacuum cleaners. The heroes are extremely handsome, and rarely smile. When they do, the screen lights up and glows. The heroines are beautiful, and seesaw through emotions as the stories unfold.

There are street fights, car chases, hospital scenes, closeups with clenched fists and teary eyes, and the first kiss usually happens after at least four episodes. There are trips to the country, to the sea, to the hometown villages, and visits to temples and colibariums, where the ashes of the dead are kept in urns, surrounded by photos and synthetic flowers.

The titles are weird but descriptive - Crash Landing on You, Boys Flowers, Over Extraordinary Attorney Woo, Uncontrollably Fond - and the subtitles not always perfectly grammatical, but this is no deterrent. Social issues are often part of the storyline - autism, single motherhood, school bullying and tension created by pushy parents, powerful companies and corruption, wicked stepmothers who wield too much power, hospital life and social media damage. Overall themes are friendship, family values, love, and traditional values being upended by Western materialism and individualism.

There is more: historical period pieces with wonderful sets and costumes, and zombie style movies with scary character changes. I prefer the rom-coms which I find perfect for late night escapism and binge viewing, I am addicted.

In the new PostKrisi Chandelier, the interplay of fibreglass and the irregular edges of the spheres allows the light to filter through, casting beautiful shadows and creating a soft, ambient glow. This lighting effect embodies the sculptural and artisanal essence of Catellani & Smith production.
